We estimate the causal effects of US-sponsored regime changes on democracy, real incomes, and social unrest in Latin America. Though any resulting improved economic and political conditions can in no way justify US interference, we want to document exactly what the effects were. Using synthetic control methods, we find large declines in democracy, moderate declines in real per-capita
